# ANNUAL CENSUS HIGHLIGHTS

The March 1993 Annual Census of Establishments report is the tenth consecutive annual publication for this employer establishment census survey on Guam.

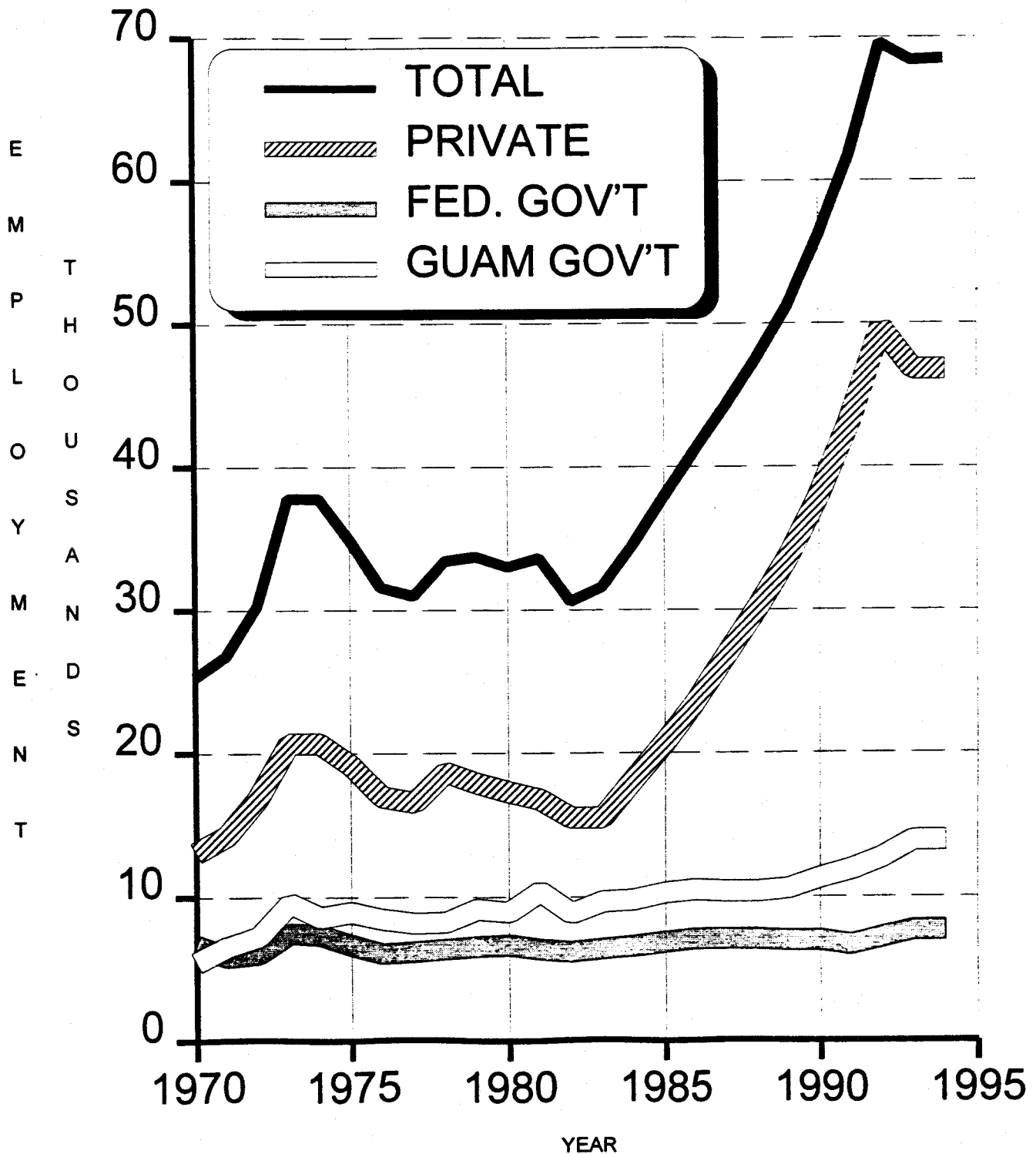
During the five year period from March 1988 to March 1993, employment growth has been very substantial with an overall increase of 20,860 jobs representing a 44 percent increase. Private sector employment during this period increased by 56 percent, whereas, government of Guam employment increased by 34 percent and Federal government 8 percent. The percentage increases by private industry and public sector during this period are as follows:

# YEARLY PAYROLL EMPLOYMENT TOTALS (IN THOUSANDS)



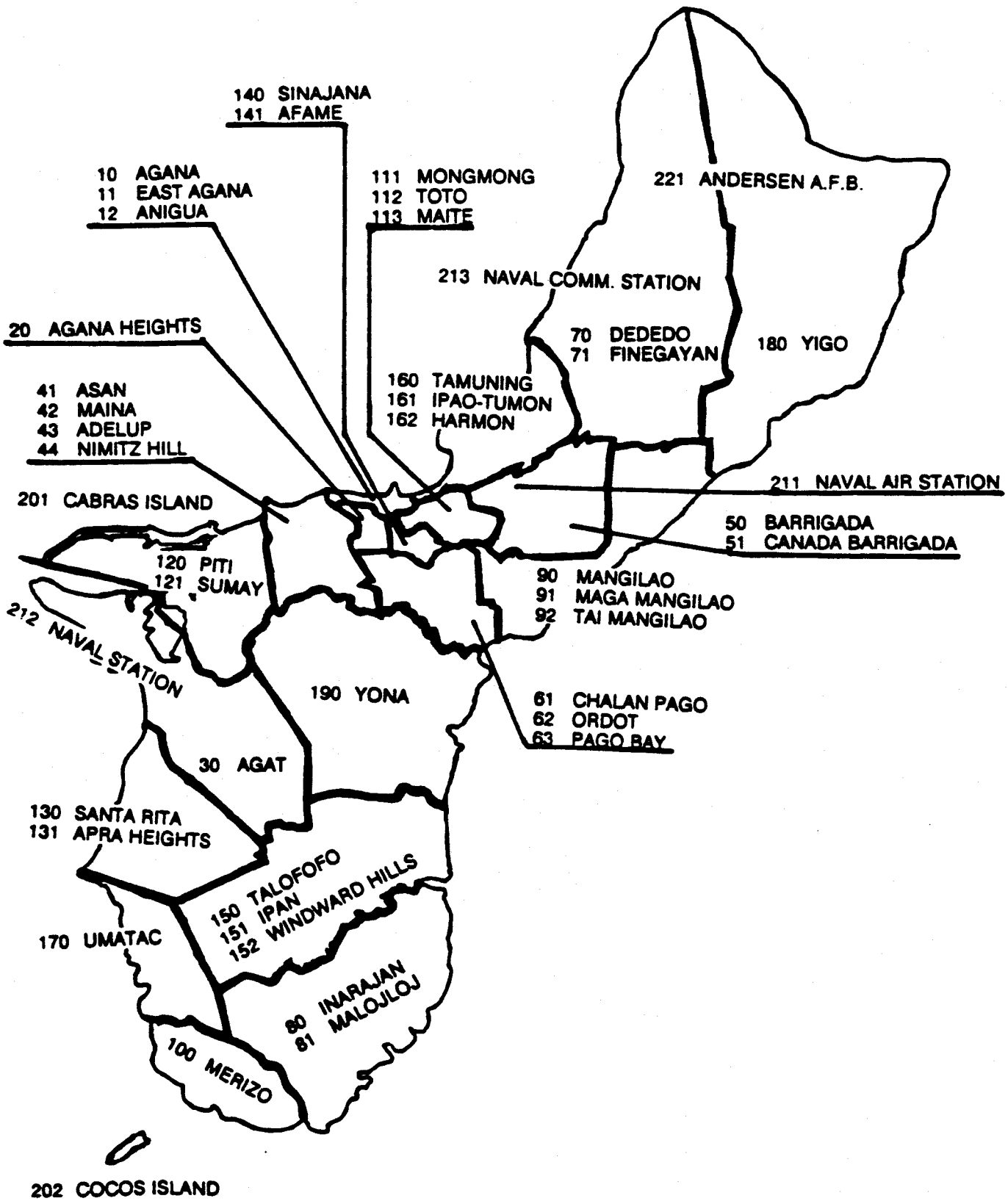

The Annual Census of Establishments' employment by citizenship tables were expanded with additional detail beginning in March 1988 to measure the effect of the Compact of Free Association Act on employment of Micronesians on Guam. From 1988 through 1990 persons from CNMI and Belau who were not reported in other classifications are reported as unclassified CNMI or unclassified Belau. In 1992 these employees are included in their respective citizenship or visa category. We began collecting and reporting data on the H-1 category in 1991. A comparative analysis of the 1988, 1989, 1990, 1991, 1992 and 1993 figures is as follows:
