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BACKGROUND ON HIES 2002

Presented herein are the basic tables from the Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI) Household Income and Expenditure Survey (HIES), conducted by the Office of Planning and Statistics in April of 2002. This document contains only basic sets of data on population, housing, income and expenditures and will be followed by a more extensive and thorough publication in mid 2003.

This was the first complete HIES to be conducted in the RMI. The primary purpose of this survey was to gather more accurate and detailed information on income and expenditure levels and flows in the RMI and to update and revise the RMI Consumer Price Index (a separate series of publications document the CPI revision efforts). This HIES was made possible through funding assistance from the US Department of the Interior's Office of Insular Affairs (OIA) and technical assistance from the OIA's Insular Areas Statistical Enhancement Program.
